Personal, Social and Emotional Development	Children will have the opportunity to share their thoughts and feelings in circle time. Pupils will be encouraged to talk about their likes and dislikes and begin to identify similarities and differences between themselves and others. Communication and Language

Literacy

Children will be encouraged to take part in circle time activities within small groups and whole class. There will be lots of opportunities for pupils to express their views, share stories and become confident to speak in a familiar group.

Pupils will have the opportunity to engage in role play to develop their expressive language.

Blast Language intervention will be delivered to target pupils to develop their expressive and receptive language and early language development.

Children will begin to recall story events and will have the opportunity to re-enact stories in their play. Pupils will explore the following stories in class.

Pupils will explore mark making and representation opportunities on a daily basis.

Children will access Phase 1 Letters and Sounds — Aspect 1 phonic activities with their Teacher to develop their understanding of General Sound Discrimination, with a particular focus on environmental sounds.


Encourage your child to speak to a range of adults in the home setting. Encourage your child to ask and answer simple questions.


Encourage your child to identify environmental sounds in the environment and home setting.

Mathematics

Mathematics key skills will include counting games, number songs, 1:1 counting, rote counting, number recognition and beginning to match quantities to numerals.



Practise counting with your child. You might like to count objects in the home setting. Encourage your child to place objects in a line whilst counting and to touch count. If you would like any Number Song lyrics please speak to Mrs Peart.



Understanding the World

Pupils will learn about their bodies and the four senses. They will begin to observe similarities and differences between themselves and others. They will explore the role of the nurse/doctor.

Pupils will care for the garden in the Autumn and ensure that the pumpkins continue to grow in readiness for Halloween. They will explore the signs of Autumn in the outdoor classroom and wider school grounds and will access Autumn in the Seasonal Investigation Station.

Encourage your child to observe and describe the signs of Autumn. Collect fallen leaves and allow your child to produce leaf collage pictures. Your child may like to bring fallen Autumnal leaves to school.



Expressive Arts and Design

Children will explore simple drawing techniques and will begin to use different line types to create representations: long lines, short lines, curved lines, thin lines, thick lines etc.

During child initiated learning pupils will have access to a wide variety of creative materials and will be able to express their own creativity. Pupils will be able to access a variety of small world and role play activities to develop expressive language.

Pupils will develop their repertoire of Nursery Rhymes, Action Songs and themed songs. They will be able to use percussion instruments and the Music Wall to create their own music.

Pupils will practise health and self-care routines including: hand washing, blowing their nose and dressing for the outdoor environment.	Encourage your child to be fully proficient when using the toilet and washing their hands. Support pupils to develop the ability to cope with dressing and undressing. 




Mathematics

Mathematics key skills will include 2D shape recognition and a growing understanding of the properties of shapes.

Pupils will learn to recognise the following shapes:

- Circle
- Sauare



Some pupils may also encounter the following shapes:

- Rectangle
- Triangle

outdoor classroom and wider school grounds and will access 'Winter' in the Seasonal Investigation Station.

Shape Activities:

Look for shapes in the home setting and when out in the local community. Encourage pupils to identify the shapes that they see. If you would like a paper set of shape cards then please see Mrs Peart. You can play simple matching/sorting games with these cards or snap if you ask for multiple sets.

Number Activities:

Practise counting with your child. You might like to count objects in the home setting. Encourage your child to place objects in a line whilst counting and to touch count. If you would like any Number Song lyrics please speak to Mrs Peart.



Encourage your child to observe and describe the signs of Winter. You might like to educate your child on the importance of feeding the birds in the Winter due to the shortage of food, hard ground and cold living conditions.

If it snows.... allow your child to play in the snow with you. Build a snowman, be a snow angel and have fun. Encourage your child to use simple language to describe how the snow feels and how their body feels. Ensure that your child is aware of the importance to wear suitable winter clothing when playing out in order to stay warm.

Expressive Arts and Design

Children will explore simple printing techniques and will begin to use different objects to print with.

During child initiated learning pupils will have access to a wide variety of creative materials and will be able to express their own creativity. Pupils will be able to access a variety of small world and role play activities to develop expressive language.

Pupils will develop their repertoire of Nursery Rhymes, Action Songs and themed songs. They will be able to use percussion instruments and the Music Wall to create their own music.

Encourage your child to sing songs from Nursery in the home setting. Please collect song lyrics etc as they become available.

Allow your child to access a wide range of creative activities: painting, collage, creative role play etc. Why not make a Leaf Man with your child using instructions provided?
